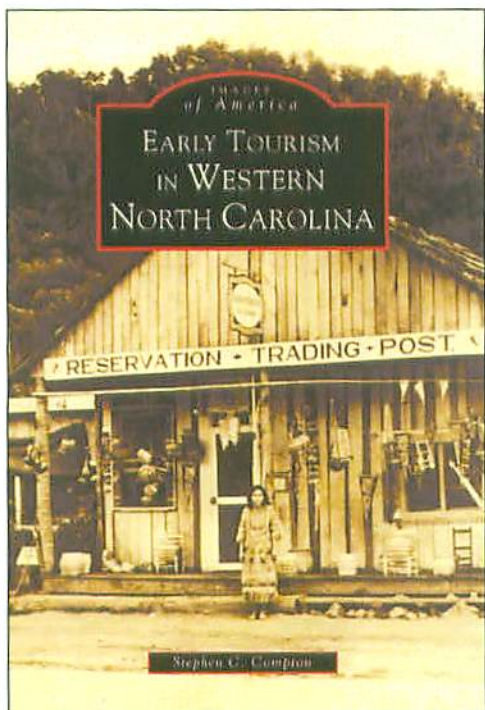

- Other great sites of the Western North Carolina region, such as the Great Smoky Mountains National Park, Grandfather Mountain, Blowing Rock, Asheville, Chimney Rock, the Biltmore Estate, and the Cherokee Indian Reservation.
